"An Architectural Tour of Essex Village" In 2015, Essex Historical Society revived its popular walking tours after a six year hiatus. Hally Siddons, A Brief Biography



Hally started her career as a musician. A strong proponent of music education in the schools, she developed music programmes in Canada, England and the United

States, consistently producing award winning concert bands and orchestras. Although retired she retains her passion for the arts and is presently working on a local board to establish a municipal concert hall in Ottawa.


Retirement brought time to study international issues, always an interest. In 2010 after meeting Dr. Sima Samar, Chair of the Afghanistan Independent Human Rights Commission and learning more of the plight of Afghan women, Hally decided there were things she and others could do to help. She initiated and continues to lead an active study and project group in her Canadian Federation of University Women-Ottawa Club and has identified further interested members nationally. Continuing to learn themselves, the members raise awareness in their community, nationally and internationally, advocate for Afghan women and girls, and support them as they can including raising funds for scholarships at the Gawharshad Institute of Higher

Education in Kabul, founded by Dr. Samar. They believe education, and especially education for women, is the significant key to Afghanistan's future.

A past president of the 500 member CFUW Ottawa club, Hally has added Afghan women to the agenda at AGMs from Newfoundland to British Columbia, at the Women Graduates-USA AGM in Utah, presented a seminar paper and led a workshop at the International Federation of University Women Triennial Conference in Istanbul, worked to help develop an Afghan highly respected affiliate within this Graduate organization (now Women International, GWI) and led a Parallel Session at the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women in New York.

Dr. Samar reminds us the job in Afghanistan is not done. While remarkable progress has been made within, there is an ongoing need for knowledgeable voices to speak for Afghan women and girls outside the country. Hally is most grateful for the work of the international community to date but urges it to stay the course as Afghans, and especially Afghan women, continue to strive with infinite courage and determination to help themselves and their families.

It can roll off your tongue so easily - bringing peace and stability to the fragile country of Afghanistan just won't happen, but there are contingents of Afghan women who with incredible courage and determination can and are making a difference in this war weary country. This growing cohort are desperate for an education, to have a salaried job, to have influence in their family, to have a say in government and at peace tables, and to hold up at least some of the Afghan sky.

Hally Siddons will tell us how members of the Canadian Federation of University Women have worked to understand the plight of these women, to advocate for them, and to provide support in Afghanistan and in Ottawa. An Afghan proverb says "drop by drop a river is made." And this is how Afghan women and girls will gain their human rights and take an equal place in civil society.
