MEETING MINUTES

LCV AAUW Branch Meeting May 11th, 2016

Business Meeting: The meeting was called to order at 6:45 pm by Vice-President Sharon . New members and guests were welcomed. A motion was made to waive reading of the minutes for our March 2016 meeting and this was seconded. The minutes were approved as written.

Election of Officers: Olga introduced the slate of candidates for 2016-2017. They are Audrey C. for President, Sharon H.I for Vice-President, Mary Jane P. for Treasurer and Deborah D. for Secretary. There was a unanimous voice vote in favor of all these candidates.

Budget: Mary Jane P. presented the budget proposed by the LCV Board at their May 6, 2016 meeting. Total projected income for the upcoming year is \$17,310: \$9000 gross income from the Author's Luncheon, \$7360 from membership dues, \$750 from Great Decisions group, and \$200 from fundraiser for Women's Legal Aid Fund (LAF). Total expenses are projected to be \$17, 310: dues payments of \$4508 to national AAUW and \$920 to State of CT AAUW; \$9000 for Author's Luncheon disbursements; \$1000 for room rentals and programs; \$750 for cost of books for Great Decisions; \$400 for Hospitality; \$200 for membership expenses; \$202 for insurance; \$130 for maintenance of the website; \$200 to support Women's LAF. The membership voted unanimously to approve the proposed budget.

Recognition: The LCV Board has recommended that Eva B. be honored by our Branch this year in memo to CT and National AAUW for her wonderful and dedicated work in preparing the LCV newsletter and website. All members present at the meeting agreed and congratulated Eva.

Membership: Claudia W. reported that membership in our LCV Branch has increased to 101 people (including 6 people who are dual

members with another branch). Membership dues of \$80 are due by July 1, 2016. Checks should be made payable to the LCV Branch of AAUW and sent to Claudia Workman. (Note: Our LCV Branch only keeps \$21 of the \$80 for each member. The rest of the money is sent to the National and State of CT AAUW organizations).

Scholarship: Rose P. reported that three of our previous scholarship recipients (Alexis H., Amanda M. and Briana P.) will be graduating from college this month. All three expressed great appreciation to the AAUW for our support. We are again funding a student Megan D. to attend the NCCWSL meeting in June. The deadline for this year's scholarship applications is May 30th. We plan on donating \$2000 to each of two qualified students this year.

Program Committee: Mary M. reported that 25 tickets have been sold thus far to see *The 39 Steps* at the Ivoryton Theater on June 8th which is our End-of Year Event. Snacks and drinks will be available in the tent starting at 6:30 pm and the show will start at 7:30 pm. We only have a total of 60 tickets at the reduced price of \$32 per person so members were encouraged to contact Mary to reserve tickets within one week.

Author's Luncheon: Sara K. reported that next year's event will be on Saturday April 1st. It will again be held at the Old Saybrook Point Inn as the Committee felt other venues were either too expensive or not appropriate for our needs. Our speakers will be Dawn Tripp, author of "Georgia" about the artist Georgia O'Keefe and a second author to be announced at a later date.

Interest Groups: The next Cultural Group trip will be a cruise to the Thimble Islands on June 2nd. Interested members should contact Pat L. to reserve a spot.

Mary Jane P. reported that the Evening Book Group will meet to discuss *Mary Chestnut's Civil War Diaries* on May 24th at 7 pm at the home of Deborah D.. The Joint Book Club meeting will again be held at Mary Ann K.'s home on June 13th. The book to be discussed that evening is *Just Mercy*.

Sharon H. reported that the Gourmet Group plans on a picnic dinner on June 11th at Dawn B.'s home in Essex. Mahjong group continues to meet but would welcome new members.

There being no further new business raised by any member present, Sharon H. concluded the Business Meeting at 7:15 pm.

Featured Speaker: Our speaker was Susan Jerome, who is an Associate Professor at the University of Rhode Island. She gave a fascinating talk entitled "Downton Abbey: Fashion and Social Change." She reviewed how political and popular movements (including the Industrial Revolution, women's suffrage, World Wars, Women's Rights movement, etc) have impacted styles and fashion trends from the 1800's to the present time. We have witnessed vast changes, as women have gone from sewing their own clothes in their homes, to patronizing local seamstress shops, to traveling to couturier designers in Paris, London or New York, then to buying ready-made clothes in department stores and on the internet. Clothing has become shorter and more comfortable to allow women to participate in business, sports and other leisure activities outside the home.
