FRIDAY, MARCH 21 - EVENT CHANGE

Due to an unexpected change in exhibits at The Bruce Museum we will now be heading north to The Springfield Museums in Massachusetts – comprised of five world-class museums. We will spend the day at the museums – 5 museums – one admission price (seniors \$15- adults \$20 including docent led tour – see below) and take lunch at the Blake House Café on the museum campus. The Café menu offers a variety of panini's, soups and sandwiches. We will carpool to Springfield. Please let me know by March 7th if you would like to join us and if you are willing to drive and how many passengers you can take.

Of particular interest will be a visit to the Michele & Donald D'Amour Museum of Fine Arts for a docent led tour of the ground-breaking exhibition, *Intent to Deceive: Fakes and Forgeries in the Art World*, which "explores some of the most infamous scandals of the past century and the forgers that perpetrated them."

FRIDAY, APRIL 11 – EARLY NYC IMMIGRANTS: FROM 1600'S TO EARLY 1900'S

NEW AMSTERDAM WALKING TOUR – LOWER MANHATTAN - MORNING

A sampling of the tour includes historical landmarks and subjects such as: how New Amsterdam affected New York's and then America's diversity, religious tolerance, and explore myths versus reality. The 3 Anglo-Dutch Wars will be discussed as well as how the early Dutch roots made their way into the U.S. Constitution. How many people even know that New York City became Dutch again and was called NEW ORANGE (1673-1674) before reverting back to New York City? Suggested reading: "The Island at the Center of the World" by Russell Shorto (2004) – considered to be one of the top books about the early history of New York City.

The group price is \$300 for the 90min tour and the individual price will be determined by the final group size. Please contact me by **March 15th** to insure a place on this very popular tour.

FRIDAY, MAY 9 – STONE BARNS CENTER FOR FOOD & AGRICULTURE

Stone Barns Center for Food & Agriculture is a non-profit farm and educational center with a partner restaurant, Blue Hill at Stone Barns, located in Westchester Country, NY. The Center was created on the Rockefeller estate in Pocantico Hills by David Rockefeller and his daughter, Peggy Dulany. The mission of Stone Barns is to: increase public awareness of healthy, seasonal and sustainable food; train farmers in resilient, restorative farming techniques; educate children about the sources of their food, and prepare them to steward the land that provides it.

*****A commitment for this trip must be made by March 25^{th,}** as deposit of \$250 is required in advance for the group. We will carpool to Stone Barns so please also let me know if you are willing to drive and how many passengers you can take.

Option 1 - Group Tour Cost: \$25 per guest

Get an intimate, behind-the-scenes view of the farm with a one-hour in-depth tour. Learn

about the Center's methods of raising livestock and growing vegetables sustainably. Walk

through the greenhouse and growing fields, and meet the animals raised on the farm. Tour

content changes with each season, as does life on the farm.

Each guest will receive a gift of Stone Barns farmfresh produce (eggs, blended tea or herbs).

Option 2 - Group Tour and 'Taste of Stone Barns' Lunch Cost: \$65 per guest Tour as described above with a "Taste of Stone Barns" buffet lunch provided by Blue Hill Café The lunch will feature farm-fresh ingredients, with exact menu selections changing daily.

We received lovely thank you notes from our two educational grant recipients, Caitlin and Santina, after they received the second half of their grants at our Annual Tea on January 11th. Both express how our grants have made it possible for them to continue their education and reach their goals, giving them opportunities not otherwise available.

We are pleased to announce that the LCV Board agreed to sponsor two students this year to attend the annual National Conference for College Women Student Leaders, NCCWSL, to be held on June 5-7th at the University of Maryland. Both are freshmen at Middlesex Community College and are amongst 15 students in the prestigious honors program. Melissa is a General Studies major and Kristen is majoring in Chemistry with the goal of becoming a patent attorney. We will fully fund one student at \$500 and another at \$250, with a matching grant from CT AAUW. Several of our branch members met both students at the AAUW

College and University Partnership Conference at CCSU, held this past October. They are impressive young women worthy of our support.

The Scholarship Committee met during February to begin planning for the upcoming educational grant cycle 2014-2015. We are currently designing our advertising media and anticipate postings on May 1st with awards being announced by July 15th, earlier than in past years. The funding for this grant cycle is to be allocated by the LCV Board, upon determining the proceeds earned from the upcoming Book/Author fundraiser. AAUW General Meeting February 12, 2014 Acton Library

Treasurer's Report –Dot is away so Mary presented her report:

- Savings: \$2,433.99
- Bequest \$17,447.79
- Total \$21,747.94

Second semester funds for our grant recipients have been dispersed, new member dues for State and National have been paid and LAF contribution of \$245 has been submitted to National.

Membership –Nancy reported we had 1 renewal and 1 new member join for a total of 106 members.

Programs-Carolyn reminded everyone that the next meeting is **March 5**th. This is a change from the membership booklet. Mary handed out reminder

sheets. The Admiral is not able to make it and her replacement is also not available so we are waiting to hear who will be speaking. Tina is in touch with the Coast Guard and should know tomorrow – Feb 13^{th} – who will be available. The **April meeting** is **April 16th**. Please note this change on your calendar.

Hospitality-Tina did a wonderful job filling in for Lynn , who is on vacation. Thanks to Mary and Nancy for baking.

Newsletter-Eva reported that she and Dot have a phone appointment with National on Feb 20th to discuss our branch's website. They are not certain when the site will be done. When it is she will be very careful that a member's address and/or phone is not printed.

AAUW Funds and Fundraiser- Mary Ann reported things are moving along for the fund raiser. The committee had a meeting and will have another next week. They will only be selling 140 tickets for the luncheon. The choices are vegetable lasagna or chicken marsala. Saybrook Point will try to accommodate a guest needs if they know in advance. Mary Ann also noted that members who can't attend or wish to give an additional donation can do so and can note if they want their donation to go to National or Branch funds.
