CULTURAL TRIPS

September 20 Wednesday

The Great Hunger Museum at Quinnipiac University tour at 11 AM

We will meet at Exit 65 in Westbrook at the back of the parking lot near Denny's for carpooling at **10:20 a.m.** Feel free to let me know if you will want a ride OR if you will be a driver and take riders. A donation of \$5 to the Museum is requested for the private tour. Please just let Eileen B. know if you will attend as soon as you can but **no later than September 10.** Once those going have been identified, we will decide on self-pay lunch spots [or of course everyone may go wherever else they wish!]

Come for the Art; Come to understand how the USA became so Irish; or, just come for the good company of AAUW Lower CT Valley members. But, please come!

The Great Hunger Museum at Quinnipiac University documents in art and artifacts the avoidable tragedy of 1845-52 in which 1.5 million Irish children and adults starved. The Great Hunger [also called The Famine] began as potato crops successively failed, but its magnitude was caused by the political and economic policies by the British that continued to export the good potatoes for international trade even as death by starvation reached its peak. Eventually, worldwide activism drew enough attention to the plight of Irish families that pressure to change the policy of denying aid and exporting foods was changed.

In the process the USA was changed and Ireland was changed forever. The number of emigrants to the US [and their ability in the USA to regain physical and economic health] led to the startling demographic changes that still characterize both our nations today.

The Great Hunger Museum contains the largest collection of Irish and Irish American art anywhere in addition to some of the very important [and there were very few!] period paintings of The Famine. World famous pieces such as the amazing bronze sculpture of The Coffin Ship are there: prepare to be haunted by beauty. Prepare also to think about the effect of foreign policy on individuals everywhere.

Mary Noonan Cortright has created a specialized tour for AAUW on September 20 at 11:00 a.m. She will emphasize the roles of women in the famine, in the art [both as subjects and artists], in the workhouses, as immigrants

and emigrants, and as historians and activists seeking to educate about The Great Hunger so it never has to happen again.
