The Speaker is Eileen B who will discuss

"International Aid: Benefit or Burden?"

An overall view of the history of international assistance and a few micro-films of examples will set the stage for us to break into smaller interactive groups leading to a discussion of key policy areas [e.g. education, health, infrastructure and natural disasters]. As proposals for seismic shifts in U S international policy surround us, this is likely be a timely and lively discussion. Eileen offers us her opinion, based on decades of experience and endless hours of reading and writing -- just enough to know, she says, that she is sure she can never know it all.

After a first career working domestically on policy and finance issues for state and local governments as well as professional organizations and the private sector, she worked abroad beginning almost immediately after the demise of the Soviet Union. Eileen worked with the US government both in Treasury and State departments as well as for the World Bank and international development banks. Her focus was on assisting local leaders bring their country more credible and responsive systems to raise, spend and account for public monies.

Eileen B. spent what she calls her 2nd career working abroad in 43 countries most recently for the International Monetary Fund [IMF]. She lived in five different countries for 2 - 4 years each and also spent time working intensively with people in many others. She seems to have fallen in love with the diversity of the world and admits to feeling privileged to have gotten to know so many perspectives.
