Guest Speaker: MaryAnne Borrelli, Ph.D.

MaryAnne Borrelli is a professor of Government at Connecticut College in New London. She specializes in presidential studies and women-and-politics. Professor Borrelli will discuss, in her presentation, the politics, policy and power the presidents' wives have asserted throughout the modern presidencies and will discuss the changes that might occur when the president's spouse is a male rather than a female. As the West Wing has grown in power and organizational complexity during the modern presidency, so also has the East Wing, office home of the First Lady of the United States. Professor Borrelli will offer both theoretical and substantive insight into the behind-the-scenes developments from the time of Lou Henry Hoover

to our present first lady, Michelle Robinson Obama.

As Borrelli defly asserts, the women who have taken on the first lady's post have succeeded because of and in spite of the convoluted merger of politics and gender. She concludes that the First Ladies have been, and will continue to be, assessed, evaluated, and scrutinized by both the public and politicians. While the First Lady will never be an official member of the federal government, she will always represent the country at home and abroad; thus, a study of them, as individuals and as a collective body, is also a reflection of us as a people.

Top Stories

AAUW continues to be a leading voice in raising awareness about sexual violence in K-12 education. Parents and advocates need to know who their children's Title IX coordinators are, and more importantly, that the coordinator understands the full scope of her or his job. AAUW created an innovative tool to help you do exactly that—find out who your K-12 school district's Title IX coordinator is today. Then deliver the U.S. Department of Education's guide to the coordinator's office to ensure that students on campus have access to their Title IX civil rights. AAUW members have delivered Title IX guidance to over 700 schools in 28 states to make sure schools are aware of their obligation to enforce laws against sex discrimination, including bullying and harassment based on sex.

AAUW Supports legislation to improve STEM fields Rep. Jackie Speier (D-CA) held a press conference on Thursday, September 22, to introduce the Federal Funding Accountability for Sexual Harassers Act. The act would require universities and colleges to report substantiated findings of sexual abuse by professors in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) fields to any federal agency from which they are receiving competitive development grants. AAUW's Senior Government Relations Manager Anne Hedgepeth was invited to speak at this press conference. Her remarks cited AAUW's research that shows sexual harassment is one of the reasons many women exit STEM fields. In addition, Rep. Barbara Lee (D-CA) introduced the AAUWsupported Computer Science for All Act, a bill that would authorize \$250 million in grants over five years to advance computer science education for pre-K through 12th graders. This effort builds on last week's White House Computer Science for All Summit, where President Barack Obama highlighted the dire need for professional computer science training – a necessity in a technology-driven economy.

AAUW Jeer of the Week

Wyoming State Rep. Gerald Gay (R-Casper) claimed the gender pay gap is a "fact of life" because women have a "dependability issue." Rep. Gay cited maternity leave and sick days as reasons that women may not show up for work.

MEETING MINUTES

LCV AAUW Branch Meeting September 14, 2016

The meeting was called to order at 7:15 pm by Audrey. New members who were present were introduced to the group and included Maggie S., Diane M., Linda F. and Briana P. (previous AAUW scholarship winner).

The minutes from the May 11, 2016 meeting were approved by voice vote.

An announcement was made about an upcoming AAUW conference to be held at Tunxis Community College in Farmington on September 23rd. Members were encouraged to attend if they were interested and report back to our branch.

Treasurer's Report: Mary Jane . reported that we have \$4248.28 in Savings (of which \$2270 is set aside for scholarship obligations for the rest of 2016 and 2017). There is \$2393.84 in Checking.

Membership: Sara and Sally reported that we have eleven new members this year, bringing our LCV Branch membership to 95. Sara and Sally have been working with Eva and Barbara on the Membership Directory which is due to go to the printer shortly. The new Directory will be handed out at our October 5th meeting. Members were asked to take their name tags home with them tonight and to remember to bring them to each meeting. This new practice will help the Membership Committee as they will no longer have to carry the large, heavy case of all membership cards to every meeting.

Interest Groups: Sharon gave an update on all interest group activities. She encouraged everyone to sign up for activities that interest them on sheets available tonight at the back of the meeting hall.

Sharon reported that The Dinner Series Group will start the year with a Cocktail Party at 6pm on October 1st at her home. Members are asked to bring an appetizer to share and any drinks they wish to have. Branch members were encouraged to join the Dinner Group which usually has four events each year, including a brunch and BBQ.

The Mah Jongg group is also chaired by Sharon. It will meet the second Tuesday of each month at 1 pm at different group member's homes.

There are two Bridge Groups: Bonnie reported that the afternoon group meets the third Monday of every month from 1-3 pm with their next meeting on September 19th. Tina reported that the evening group meets the first Thursday of the month at 7pm. The next meeting is October 6th. Each group has 2-3 tables at each meeting. These groups are intended for members who already know how to play bridge, but members who may "need a refresher" on conventions are also encouraged to join.

The Book Groups were discussed next. Olga is chair of the Afternoon Book Group which meets the first Wednesday of each month from 1-3 pm. Their discussion book in October will be "When Breath Becomes Air." Mary Jane chairs the Evening Book Group which meets the fourth Tuesday of each

month from 7-9 pm. The next meeting is September 27th at Dot's home. The book will be "LaRose."

The group will meet the first Tuesday and third Monday of each month through June. The Foreign Policy Association has not yet released this year's topic but Donna hopes to have this soon.

Cultural Trips Group is co-chaired by Dot and Pat. Dot reported that the first trip will be on October 13th to the Osborne Homestead Museum and Gardens in Derby, CT. This is an historic home with 350 acres of farmland. The group will carpool to the museum in the morning and will have lunch nearby (place TBD) after the tour.

The next trip is on November 1st to the 9/11 Museum in New York. There are only two tickets remaining for this trip. Members will travel by train from Old Saybrook or Westbrook to NYC. We will tour the museum together and then have lunch afterwards. Attendees should give their checks for this event to Pat who has already paid for the tickets.

There is a theater trip to Long Wharf on December 7th to see "Other People's Money." Members will have lunch first at Brazzi's right next door to the theater. The play starts at 2 pm.

Legal Advocacy Fund. Dawn B. discussed this important AAUW effort to provide women with legal advice and support for equal pay and opportunity in the workplace. Dawn encouraged all members to donate to this fund while they were here tonight.

Author's Luncheon: Sara reminded everyone that our yearly Author's Luncheon will be on April 1st at the Saybrook Point Inn. This is our biggest fundraiser of the year to support college scholarships. Members were encouraged to attend and bring a friend. If you can't attend, please buy a ticket to support the effort.

Scholarship Committee: Rose read a letter from Megan, one of this year's scholarship recipients who was unable to be here as planned tonight. Megan wrote to tell us how much she appreciated

the support of the AAUW to attend college and also this past June's NCCWSL meeting. Megan is a senior this year at UCONN and plans to go into Marketing. Our other student Viktoria C is doing very well at Elon University. Viktoria plans to come to our January Tea.

By-Laws and Public Policy: Audrey reported that Lynn D. will continue to be our resource for AAUW By-Laws. Barbara H. will continue on Public Policy. Barbara discussed the national AAUW's commitment to equity for women in the workplace and politics. She encouraged members to check their website at advocacy@aauw.org. Currently, there is a petition being circulated to have more women moderators for the presidential debates.

Other Business: Audrey . updated the group on the new No Alcohol Policy at events at St. Ann's Church (and throughout the Episcopal Diocese) without prior permission from the vestry. Although St. Ann's was willing to allow AAUW to serve alcohol as they have always found us to be a responsible group, our LCV AAUW Branch does not have any liability insurance for any alcoholrelated accidents which might occur. Therefore, our Board decided not to serve alcohol tonight at the Pot Luck Supper here at St. Ann's Hall. The Board has investigated what such liability insurance might cost and found this to be unacceptably high at \$185 per function. The Board will continue to collect new information on this issue as well as to obtain written confirmation that we are covered by our insurance for events held at individual AAUW member's homes.

Audrey also informed the group that we will endeavor to reach out more to members who are ill, have a death in the family or even some major happy event. She sent a note recently to wish a speedy recovery to Carolyn C. who has been hospitalized and is now recovering at home. She also congratulated Dawn B. on her recent 50th wedding anniversary and family trip to Thailand.

Our next Branch Meeting will be on October 5th at 6:45 pm at the Essex Library. Our speaker Professor Maryanne Borrelli will present "When East Meets West" about the influence of the Presidents' spouses.
