# **SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE**

Rising, AAUW CT College/University Lin Relations Chair, attended our October 14th branch meeting and presented on her role within the state with respect to the AAUW CT College/University Regional Organization. Geographically, CT is divided into three regions that include 29 colleges/universities and 10 AAUW branches. Our branch is in Region II which includes Connecticut College, Eastern CT State U, Middlesex CC, Mitchell College, Quinebaug Valley CC, UCONN, Wesleyan U, and Three Rivers CC. Lin spoke about campus and branch outreach activities and collaborations involving AAUW programs such as Start Smart, Elect Her, and the annual National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL). AAUW CT provides matching grants to branches that sponsor students to attend NCCWSL, and, this year, there were 56 students from CT who attended the conference at the University of Maryland in May. Two of those students are Briana and Amanda , who were sponsored by our branch with matching funds from the state.

Briana and Amanda also attended our October 14<sup>th</sup> branch meeting and spoke about their experience at NCCWSL. Both said how much they enjoyed the conference from both personal and professional viewpoints. They met other students with varying backgrounds, realized that they have similar concerns, and mentioned that they stay in touch with new friends. They liked the workshops in particular, since there were opportunities to discuss issues facing young women such as equal pay and managing finances, as well as learning how to speak

up in general and negotiate for what you want. Amanda said she already put her new skills to practice by negotiating the price of a new dress which she bought. Briana mentioned that the opportunities networking regarding graduate schools were helpful and also said how much the conference inspired her to further her leadership She was recently elected as VP of her skills. Amanda aspires to become a radiologic sorority! technician and Briana an art education teacher. Both will graduate next spring.

## AAUW Lower CT Valley Branch Meeting 10/14/15

**Business Meeting:** The meeting was called to order by President Dawn B. at 7:05 pm. The September 2015 minutes were approved.

**Treasury** update was given by Mary Jane P.. Checking has \$2070.21. Savings \$4,023.11. Bequest Account \$17,453.

**Program Committee**. Kate M., an authority on Middle Eastern affairs will speak at our November 18<sup>th</sup> branch meeting at 7pm in the Acton Library. Her talk is entitled "The Suni/Shia Divide, Understanding the Differences."

**Scholarship Fund**. The Shoreline Branch plans to have a luncheon at the Clinton Country Club on Nov 7<sup>th</sup> to raise money for their scholarship fund.

**Membership** update was given by Claudia W.. We have 97 members. New AAUW membership directories are also now available.

**Public Policy** activities at the national level were reviewed briefly by Barbara H.. She urged all members to familiarize themselves with what AAUW does to empower and inform women and promote networking. You can check www.aauw.org/actionnetwork to find out more.

**Interest groups** update was given by Sharon H.. All groups have had one or more meetings. The next Majong group will meet at Barbara S's house on Oct 21<sup>st</sup>. The Dinner Series will have a Pot Luck on November 7<sup>th</sup> and plans a brunch in January, another potluck in May and a barbeque sometime in the Spring.

Olga S. reported that the afternoon and evening book groups will have a joint meeting at 7pm on Oct 27<sup>th</sup> at the Acton Library to discuss Kalamazoo Girls. The author will also attend. The afternoon book group will meet at Kristin O's home on 11/4 to discuss The Nightingale.

Dot B. reported that the next cultural trip is planned for 10/15 to the Thankful Arnold House in Haddam. On November 19<sup>th</sup>, there is trip to the Henry Whitfield House in Guilford with lunch at the Wharf restaurant in Madison. Finally, there is trip to see Measure for Measure at the Long Wharf Theatre and lunch at Brazzi's on December 16<sup>th</sup>. The cost is \$49.75 for the matinee and \$21 for lunch. Payment should be sent to Dot.

Hospitality Chair Audrey C. reported that 54 members attended the Pot Luck Dinner in September.

Dot B. also asked the group to support the Safe Futures organization. They need winter clothing for women and children, cleaning supplies and feminine hygiene products. Anyone interested in donating items should contact Dot.

Evening Program was introduced by Rose P.. The featured speaker was Dr. Melinda Rising who is the liaison for the CT AAUW College/University NCCWSL activities. Linn reviewed the history of NCCWSL over the past 10 years and how this group has been very successful in attracting college and university students into AAUW. A total of 56 students from CT attended this year's NCCWSL meeting at the University of Maryland. Two students (Amanda M. and Briana P. who our branch sponsored this year) participated in a panel discussion about their experience at the NCCWSL meeting. Both reported how valuable it was for them to network with other students from around the world, to attend workshops on leadership and negotiation skills, mentoring programs, technology and many others. It was apparent that this was a truly a formative experience for both of these young women.

**Other Business:** During the meeting, one of the Acton Library staff members came into the room to inform us that we would need to leave the building by 8:30. She said that it has always been library policy for everyone to be out of the building by 8:30. However, our local branch meetings as well as Great Decisions have often run to 9 pm and attendees have just left by the side door.
