Mark your calendars and join our Branch members, as we share in a joint meeting with the Shoreline Branch members, to welcome two distinguished women, Dr. Ruth Braunstein and Jinshing Wu. They are this year's recipients of AAUW's National awards and grants. The meeting will be held at the

Westbrook Library, 61 Goodspeed Dr., at 7:00 P.M., April 15th. All are welcomed and encouraged to bring a friend to share the evening with these two outstanding women.

Dr. Ruth Braunstein is an assistant professor in the Dept. of Sociology at U. Conn. Her research explores the diverse ways in which ordinary citizens across the political spectrum participate in public life, and the complex role of religion in this process. She has studied conservative and progressive religious advocacy groups, interfaith political coalitions, and debates over same-sex marriage and evolution in public schools. She is currently working on a book, with the help of an AAUW "Publication Grant", based on a comparative ethnographic study of faith-based community organizing and Tea Party activism.

Jingshing Wu is a Ph.D. candidate in the field of cellular and molecular physiology. Her project name is entitled "Mechanisms Involved in AMPK-Regulated Tight-Junction Assembly." Ms. Wu is studying how to prevent acute kidney injury, a disease that occurs when kidney cells die in response to low oxygen levels. She is investigating proteins that may improve kidney cell survival by maintaining kidney cell attachment to each other during the disease.
