Date: Wednesday, March 13th Place: Essex Public Library Time: 6:45 PM

Join us as we welcome Professor Stephen Gencarella as our guest speaker for the March meeting. Stephen is the resident folklorist at the Connecticut River Museum and teaches folklore studies at UMass Amherst, where his work focuses on the cultural traditions of the Connecticut River Valley. He will be sharing his latest publication, Wicked, Weird and Wily Yankees. The book tells the incredible stories of the prophets, vagabonds, fortune-tellers, hermits, lords and poets who shaped New England. Stretching back to the colonial era and covering the development and evolution of New England society through the beginning of the twenty-first century, the book captures the rebel spirits, prickly demeanors, and wily attitudes that have made the region the hotbed of oddity it is today.

Before our meeting, you can enjoy Stephen's writing in the Connecticut River Museum's latest

the Steamboat Log and his publication exploration of the folklore tales of ghostly apparitions, "footprints" of titanic beings and other stories around one of our most idyllic local parks, Devil's Hopyard. Also, he is the featured writer in the latest issue of Connecticut *Explored*, where he explores the legends, myths and traditional tales about the Connecticut river in his article, Two Connecticut River Legends. Share an evening with this charismatic, entertaining, incredibly vivacious. knowledgeable speaker, Professor Stephen Gencarella. You will not be disappointed.

CULTURAL TRIPS

YALE'S BEINECKE RARE BOOK AND LIBRARY TOUR March 20

2:00 pm - guided tour approx 45 min unlimited self exploration of exhibits voluntary/suggested \$5 donation [just give whatever amount you choose to Eileen] RSVP: to Eileen

The Beinecke is world famous -- more so now that two novels have recently been published that feature it [or its fictional counterpart].

Located on the Yale Campus at the edge of New Haven Green, we can easily take the train from Westbrook to the NH RR Station and then the shuttle to the Green. Even sloppy driving weather should not prove much of a threat for this cultural event. [Suggested train times and lunch options will be sent to those who register.]

Our tour will be guided personally by Michael Morand, Communications Director. The guided tour itself will show some of the outstanding architectural features of the building and talk of its history. Before or afterward [the Library remains open until 7pm on March 20], one or all may linger among the varied exhibitions.

Attendance is limited to 14. Please email Eileen as soon as possible to reserve a place.

GRAND CENTRAL TERMINAL TOUR

Reserve your place now!

We are able to book a private docent-led tour of Grand Central Terminal in NYC on Wednesday, April 24 -- shortly after we hear from the author of a novel about the GCT art school mystery. The book leads us through the terminal and involves us in some of the historic battle to keep it from being torn down.

We need 18 people to participate to make the tour private: the advantages of a private tour are that we get to specify what emphasis we want [like the book tie-ins] + we get to choose the time + a docent is chosen in advance who best meets our needs/desires for emphasis.

If fewer than 18 persons confirm and pay by April 1, we will be part of a 'public group' that day [or we can cancel the event].

We will use the train [Shoreline East from Westbrook; NH line directly into Grand Central]. Reverse on return. Westbrook station is recommended as parking is plentiful and free.

Of course, participants can use any Shoreline East station they wish.

We will take the first trains on the Off Peak schedule. We qualify for Senior Discounts on Shoreline East, which automatically qualifies us for 1/2 price fare on NH Line.

Although we will recommend train times, obviously participants may come and go as they wish.

Once at GCT, we will have time for lunch [there is a food court in the Terminal; there are two other restaurants of varying prices; there is all Manhattan right outside, including easy strolls to Rockefeller Center, MOMA, 5th Av shopping, etc.]

We will begin our Tour at 2:00. Highlights include: How Grand Central came to be How it became a Landmark The big fight to avoid its destruction and replacement with a box building. Its special role during World War II Whispering Halls Astro ceiling Underground Power Station

The 'public tour' covers all the above in terms of history and architecture.

It takes about 75 minutes. There is no break. There are no stairs. It is an easy walk. There is a 5-10 minute portion of the tour that leads us outside across the street to better notice particular architectural features.

The public trip has no breaks and very little chance to sit down.

Folding walking stick/seats are allowable.

Our private tour would include more about the book. We would want to program in a bit of a break.

Price: Tour - \$30 - Pay Eileen by end of March. [check or Apple Pay]

Transportation - pay on trains. Cash on Shoreline East.

Note: No access is available to either the FDR railway car nor to the Underground Power Station for security reasons. No access to Art School former facilities for safety concerns.

NOTE: If we do not have 18 members confirmed by March 20, we will open the tour to friends and family members.
