#### JOINT MEETING with SHORELINE AFFILIATE

The Lower Connecticut Valley AAUW Affiliate is honored to host this year's joint meeting with the Shoreline Affiliate and welcome this year's American Postdoctoral Fellow recipient, Dr. Sharde Davis.

Dr. Davis attended the University of California, Santa Barbara and conducted undergraduate research through the Ronald E. McNair Scholars Program. Her work was awarded the Steven H. Chaffe Undergraduate Research Award from the Department of Communication. Dr. Davis earned her B.A. in Communication and Feminist Studies as well as her M.A. in Communication at UCSB. She finished her Ph.D. in Communication Studies and a doctoral certificate in Gender, Women's and Sexuality Studies at the University of Iowa. Her primary area of specialization is interpersonal communication, with emphasis in racial and gender identity, resistance, counter hegemony, intra/intergroup dynamics, and supportive communication. Her specific line of research explores how Black women's complex identities --- and the power laden social structures that shape them---influence the way they communicate with close others.

Presently, Dr. Davis is an Assistant Professor at UConn's Department of Communication and is Vice-Chair of the African-American Communication and Culture Division. Her specialization is Black Feminism. Her project is titled "Testing the Health Benefits of Black Women's Support Groups" which will evaluate the effect of black women's relational closeness and group solidarity on their physical health.
