SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

The Scholarship Committee has selected three women to receive education grants for the upcoming academic year, 2019-2020. Each student was awarded a \$2000 grant which will cover two semesters. Congratulations to the following students.

Rachel. – Rachel is a senior at the University of Connecticut at Storrs and is pursuing a BA degree in Human Development and Family Sciences. She anticipates earning her degree in May 2020, after which she plans to pursue a MA in the same field. Her goal is to work in an administrative area of higher education such as Student Services. While at UCONN, Rachel has worked in the Office of Dean of Students and held an internship with the Female Center of Excellence and Leadership which is a non-profit that connects students with professionals in their prospective fields. In addition, she has mentored for various programs including First Year Experience which guides first-year students in their transition to UCONN and FAMILEE which helps LGBT youth adjust to college life.

Heather. – Heather is currently enrolled at Middlesex Community College in the Ophthalmic Design and Dispensing Program. She is finishing her second semester in a two year work/study program leading to an AS degree. She is a

working, single mother with two teenage children living in Killingworth. Her goal is to reinvent herself and pursue a career that would enable her to support herself and her family. She anticipates becoming a licensed optician. Heather holds a BA degree in Communications from Cedar Crest College, PA in 1991 and has worked as a substitute teacher, as well as a school volunteer in numerous capacities.

Tabitha . – Tabitha is a mother with two young children and a husband living in Killingworth. She holds a BS degree in Biology and Marine Sciences from the University of Tampa, FL in 2008. She works two jobs as a licensed Veterinary Technician to support the family. Her goal is to become a licensed Registered Nurse and, along with a limited number of students, was accepted into the accelerated nursing program at UCONN at Avery Point. National Conference for College Women Student

Leaders – We awarded the Alan Spargo Memorial NCCWSL Scholarship for Women to four students to attend the annual NCCWSL conference this past May at the University of Maryland. Written feedback from the students indicated that the experience helped them learn how to branch out as a woman in the community, at school, and in professional life. August 05, 2019 press release: AAUW Teams Up With New York City To Train women to "Ask for More" - AAUW has joined forces with **City Economic Development** York Corporation (NYCEDC) to train 10,000 New York City women with the skills to negotiate salary and benefits, as well as to advocate for promotions and leadership opportunities. The initiative—called "Ask for More"—includes online training sessions and, starting in the fall, a series of in-person workshops in the city's five boroughs. Future plans include offering Spanishlanguage training, as well as programs tailored to women in specific industries. An employer roundtable and other conferences are also

planned. Once fully implemented, "Ask for More" will be among the largest salary negotiation and women's leadership initiatives in the country, according to the NYCEDC.

"We are unleashing the power of education and training to address the wage gap that denies women economic security, undermines their ability to support their families, seek higher education, and access health care," said Chirlane McCray, the first lady of New York City. "This is the kind of program we must invest in if we want to support women and their financial futures, and if we want New York to continue leading the nation." "These workshops bring the city one step closer to the city we want to be—one where everyone is getting paid what they deserve," said Faye Penn, Executive Director, of Women.nyc. "These free bootcamps are designed to reach women of all backgrounds throughout the boroughs. We're proud to partner with AAUW to teach women how to ask for more as part of our effort to keep New York the greatest city in the world for women to succeed." "Our goal is for every woman to be able to articulate their value and negotiate their financial futures," said Kim Churches, Chief Executive Officer, **AAUW**. "Through this partnership, we are thrilled to help thousands of New York women recognize their full potential and to help the city become an even more equitable place for all."

Since AAUW launched its salary-negotiation program in Boston in 2015, close to 100,000 women nationwide have completed the trainings. In post-course surveys, 85 percent of online program participants report feeling more confident asking for a raise or a promotion. Thousands of women who have taken the course say that they have successfully negotiated salaries 10 to 20 percent higher than what was initially offered.
