The novel explores the women who are members of the 1936 U.S. Olympic track and field team and follows the experiences of three real-life women athletes who meet at the Nazi-sponsored Berlin Olympics. Combining historical background and compelling characters, <u>Fast Girls</u> is a memorable tribute to these women heroines.

The novel will make for an interesting and informative discussion with Elise Hooper, who has also written <u>The Other Alcott</u> about Louisa May Alcott's sister May, and <u>Learning to See</u> about Dorothea Lange, the pioneering photographer.
