



#### AAUW NATIONAL VOTING ENDS MAY 17th

Please know you have just a few weeks left to cast your vote about the bylaw change to remove the degree requirement for AAUW membership.

You should have received either an email -or- paper ballot from National with your membership ID and voting information. The online voting deadline is May 17th. Paper ballots must be postmarked by April 30th.

If you haven't voted yet, please look. A 2/3 majority of those voting is needed to approve this change. Final results will be published soon after the May 17th deadline.



#### **MEMBERSHIP**

The Lower Connecticut Valley branch members of AAUW will begin renewing their membership (2021-2022) on the May 1<sup>st</sup> using the AAUW Membership Payment Program (MPP) system. Dues will be \$93 (\$62 for National Dues, \$10 for State Dues, and \$21 for Branch Dues) which you will be paying all at once. You will be able to renew your membership by charge/debit card online or you can opt to send a check to our treasurer. **Membership dues are due by July 1st.** 

Just as we have done for the past two years, each member will receive an email from <a href="memberinfo@aauw.org">memberinfo@aauw.org</a> the beginning of May.

#### There are two ways to renew:

- 1) <u>To renew online</u> you will click on the link in the AAUW email that says "click here to pay by credit card". No sign-in or password is needed! It is really easy and no credit card information is stored on the AAUW site.
- 2) <u>To renew by check</u>: Make your check payable to AAUW for \$93 and mail it to Linda, your branch finance officer/treasurer.

Due to the COVID 19 Pandemic we have adapted to Zoom monthly meetings, Great Decisions, and book chats. We have been playing Mah Jongg virtually, have added hiking to our interest groups, and have had some great socially distant cultural trips.

We are hoping that next year we will be back to a "new normal" and everyone will renew their membership to keep our branch membership steady.

#### **SHAPE THE FUTURE CAMPAIGN**

The Shape the Future membership campaign is a tool for us to recruit **new members**. Our June meeting will be open to prospective **new members**. Any **new members** that join at this meeting will receive a **50% discount** off their national dues.

AAUW national dues for 2021-2022 are regularly \$62. Through Shape the Future, national dues are \$31.00, of which \$28 is tax deductible. (Total dues will be \$62 - \$31 National, \$10 State, and \$21 Branch.)

AAUW membership is open to anyone with an associate (or equivalent) degree or higher from an accredited educational institution. A "new member" is someone entirely new to AAUW or an individual who rejoins after two or more years of lapsed membership.

We are asking for you to invite any eligible neighbors, friends or relatives to join us at our June meeting on June 9th (rain date June 10th). Hopefully, they will join. They can join using cash, check, or credit card at this meeting.

#### **SCHOLARSHIP**


### Do you know someone who might be interested in an Educational Grant for the next year of college?

# AAUW INTERNATIONAL FELLOW SPEAKS AT APRIL JOINT MEETING



Thirty members from the Lower Connecticut Valley and Shoreline branches met at the annual joint

meeting, held via Zoom, on April 14. This event is held so members can hear from recipients of AAUW Fellowships and Grants who are attending graduate programs in Connecticut.

Gladys, who is from Zimbabwe, is a graduate of Mount Holyoke College with a dual degree in Chemistry and Chemical Engineering. She is pursuing a master's degree in biomedical engineering at the University of New Haven. Her goal is to advance the diagnosis and treatment of diseases by designing medical devices that are affordable for all countries. Her research includes medical device regulation and global best practices. She is also interested in encouraging international organizations to help increase financial literacy and STEM education for women in countries such as Zimbabwe. Gladys has already secured a post-grad job as a process engineer.

We suspected this may have been expanded from the author's dissertation; it is full of well-researched material on the lives of Virginia Woolf, Eileen Power, Jane Harrison, Dorothy Sawyers, and Hilda Doolittle (HD) --- all feminist authors who prioritized writing to change society views of women.

As Pacifists, they dwelt in the same London area between the two world wars and lived freely in a stimulating, intellectual social culture. It was a wide-ranging discussion! Gerri wrapped it up with a Virginia Woolf quote. When Woolf needed diversion from the "grind" of writing a biography, she started a novel and said, "Free in fiction after all that fact."
