INTEREST GROUPS

AFTERNOON BOOK GROUP

The Afternoon Book Group met on Wednesday, December 7th to discuss *Euphoria* by Lily King. Our discussion was led by Gayle, who helped us reflect on this novel inspired by the life of anthropologist Margaret Mead and her time in New Guinea. Thank you so much, Gayle, for helping us think about the events of the novel, the intriguing characters-- including two characters based on Mead's second and third husbands-- and the field of anthropology. Many book group members remarked that this novel made them curious to learn more about Mead and the early years of anthropology, a social science that was in its infancy at the time setting of the novel.

We reflected on the fact that many of the books we have recently read are works of historical fiction set in very different times and places. What makes historical fiction so appealing, we wondered? It was a fitting conclusion to our discussion as we determined that historical fiction helps us to understand more about events we may already know, leads us to read between the lines of historic events, and helps us discover until-nowunknown figures who have influenced history. From the U.S. women's 1936 Olympic track team to nurses in the Philippines during World War II to early anthropologists living in New Guinea-- we have travelled far in our readings!

Our selection for our January 4th meeting is *How the Word Is Passed* by Clint Smith, a non-fiction exploration of many of the sites related to slavery. Author Smith travels to Monticello, the lower Manhattan trade site of enslaved peoples, Angola Prison in Louisiana, and other places significant to slavery in America. In this beautifully written book (Smith is a poet as well as a non-fiction writer), he observes how contemporary visitors understand the legacy of slavery across America.

Looking ahead our February 1st meeting will focus on *The Magnolia Palace* by Fiona Davis, a novel about the Frick family and their mansion in New York City. Told in both the early 1900s and the 1960s, the novel is a tale of mystery as a modern-day model discovers secrets about a woman who also was a model and worked for the Frick family.

Thanks to all who participated in our December meeting ----and especially to our discussion leader, Gayle!

We hope you and your family have a wonderful holiday season. Happy reading!
