AFTERNOON BOOK GROUP

The Afternoon Book Group met on Wednesday, March 1st, to discuss *Metropolis* by B.A. Shapiro, a novel about six characters' intersecting lives in a vast storage warehouse in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Many thanks to Elaine who led our lively discussion! Elaine explained that B.A. Shapiro has a PhD in Sociology, which is reflected in one of her character's theses, and that the author had published under the name B.A. Shapiro due to the lack of her previous books' sales when using her name, Barbara Shapiro. We appreciated the many realistic elements of the setting. The actual Metropolitan Storage building in Cambridge, MA, is

currently being renovated to become M.I.T.'s Architecture Department. The characters all seemed believable and engaging with their interactions leading to a crime at the building. We decided it would make a successful television movie. Many also recommended B.A. Shapiro's earlier book, *The Art Forger*.

We also discussed the short, thought-provoking YouTube video-- brought to our attention by Deb --"The Race of Life", an exercise demonstrating the unequal advantages of people starting out on their life journeys. Here's the link: The Race of Life (white privilege). YouTube

We will discuss *The Beekeeper of Aleppo* by Christy Lefteri, a memorable novel about a couple who flee the Syrian war, travel through Turkey and Europe, and eventually end up in England where they continue to keep bees. Sara will lead the discussion.

The book for our May 3rd meeting is *Apeirogon* by Colin McCann, a novel told from two men's alternating points of view -- an Israeli and Palestinian. Both have lost family members to the ongoing war. The title is a word that means a "polygon" with infinite sides, which refers to both the storytelling structure of many short chapters, and the endless ways to understand the endless Middle Eastern conflict.
