Lower Connecticut Valley AAUW Branch Meeting November 9, 2023

Members Present: There were about 45 members and a few guests present at the meeting held at Saybrook Point Pavilion. The meeting began at 7:05 pm when Gloria Gery introduced our speaker.

Program: Gloria introduced Emma MacDonald, an Environmental Analyst at CT DEEP. Emma graduated from UConn in June 2022 with a BS in Sustainable Forest Resources. Her topic, Managing Materials Sustainably in CT, interested all those present. Emma told us the CT Coalition for Sustainable Materials Management (CCSMM) priorities include exploring ways to reduce the amount of waste generated, improve reuse and recycling, food scrap collection as well other things such as unit-based pricing where your cost for trash depends on how much you dispose of rather than a fixed rate. She also mentioned that the bottle deposit will be doubling in January 2024. Mini liquor bottles, or "nips", have a 5 cent surcharge. Emma went through What's In/What's Out for blue bin recycling.

Some key take-aways from Emma's presentation:

- Plastic bags and plastic film, also known as shrink wrap, should never be put in single stream recycling bins because they can jam equipment at the materials recovery center
- "In" recyclables include: paper and cardboard items, such as newspapers, magazines, food and beverage cartons, mixed paper and flattened boxes; pizza boxes (grease ok but no food!); glass items, such as bottles and jars; metal items, such as food and beverage cans.
- One quick rinse is enough for items to be clean enough for recycling.
- "Out" recyclables include: plastic bags and plastic wrap ; styrofoam; black plastic take-out containers; loose caps (ok if they are on the milk jug or bottle, not ok if loose!); k-cups; shredded paper (this is an air quality problem, look for separate opportunities to recycle
- Anything smaller than about 2 inches by 2 inches is sorted as glass and therefore is a contaminant in the glass stream (can NOT recycle toothbrushes, pill bottles, ...)
- Foil is recyclable if CLEAN, do NOT bunch it up since it will be assumed to be not clean
- DO NOT put your recyclables in a plastic bag since the entire bag will be thrown out
- There are places to recycle plastic bags and film (anything that you can push your thumb through). See your local stores or other locations [Walmart, Adams grocery store, Deep River Library, Deep River Town Hall]
- Just because something is recyclable doesn't mean it's able to be processed (currently) -- black take-out containers for instance are a contamination in the Connecticut recycling program because black plastic is not picked up by optical scanners at the materials recovery facilities, often referred to as a MRF, that sort and process our materials. And if they can't identify what is black plastic, it ends up getting in bales of paper, bales of aluminum or other materials and will contaminate those loads."

Emma encouraged people to get the RecycleCT app or use the online <u>RecycleCT Wizard</u> tool to determine which items are acceptable in your recycling bin.

Gloria Gery, Program Coordinator, thanked Emma for her time.

Gloria then introduced Patricia O'Brien who read her own poem, "Getting to Prayer." The entire poem can be found on the LCV Facebook page. <u>Getting to Prayer</u>

After a break, the business meeting began at 8:15 pm and was conducted by President Deb DeHertogh.

Deb shared information about Safe Futures. Located in New London, Safe Futures restores hope for those impacted by domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, and trafficking in southeastern Connecticut. They provide interim housing and transitional living arrangements, counseling, and provide advocates for court cases. They began in 1976 as The Women's Center of SE CT and in 2012 changed their name to Safe Futures to better represent all those being served by the agency. Deb thanked everyone for the donations they had made and told us that these donations will be brought to Safe Futures on 11/15 so that if anyone else wants to make a donation (items or gift cards) to speak to her or Jeannette Santovasi before then.

LCV Website -- the website is nearly completely done and should be used by everyone. Especially the calendar which lists all branch activities. Remember that the members only page has password lowmember (all lower case).

Treasurer's Report: MaryAnn ladarola was unable to attend due to illness so the report will be given next month.

Donation Button: Linda Frigon showed everyone how to access and use the donate buttons on the LCV Website. One button sends you directly to AAUW-National's site to make a donation, the other allows you to donate to the LCV Education & Scholarship Program, the 501c3 part of our branch so that your gift is tax deductible.
