SCHOLARSHIP

The Scholarship Committee is pleased to present on the final page of this Newsletter, the six students who will receive the \$4000 Educational Grants from the Lower Connecticut Valley AAUW branch. We also received reflections from the three students who attended the AAUW NCCWSL conference in June.

We sponsored three local students to attend the 2024 National Conference for College Women Student Leaders: Sydney Swann from Emerson College, Madeline Rice from Emerson College; and Grace Jacaruso from the University of South Carolina.

Describing their experience as "enriching and empowering," the women attended keynote speeches, workshops, networking sessions, and informal meetings with the other 800 attendees who gathered this June at the University of Maryland's College Park campus from around the country.

Some of the students' comments about their NCCWSL experiences include:

- --a talk on authentic leadership "emphasized staying true to oneself while leading with compassion and understanding in order to be an effective leader." --a workshop on appropriate salary negotiation "highlighting how to articulate your value to your employer."
- --a session on communicating your personal brand included "how to write an elevator pitch" which will be useful in searching for an internship.

--a talk on how to design your post-grad life and "the importance of combining your work view and life view."

--a motivational speech reminded students "that success is not only about personal gains but also about lifting others and contributing to societal progress."

The experience of NCCWSL was formative to all three students: "The opportunity to connect with peers and learn from successful women leaders was invaluable." Another student commented: "NCCWSL exceeded any and all expectations...I know I am leaving Maryland a changed person. NCCWSL taught me not only that I deserve to feel empowered, but also how to feel empowered." A third student wrote: "the NCCWSL conference inspired me to dig deep and find my voice amongst the commotion in society."

The three students expressed their gratitude to the LCV branch for the opportunity to attend NCCWSL. "I am immensely grateful to NCCWSL for organizing such a powerful and enlightening conference...thank you so much to the Lower Connecticut Valley AAUW for nominating me to attend."

Thank you all so much for all your efforts to support these students in their educational and career goals!
