The National Conference for College Women Student Leaders will be held this year from May 28 - May 30 at the University of Maryland at College Park.

TPEP/LCV COLLABORATION UPDATE

Trinity Prison Education Program

(TPEP) co-directors (Professors Anna Terwiel, Joe Lea, and James Truman) shared their plans for summer 2025. While several faculty members would like to teach at York Correctional Institute this summer, none was able to commit to a 14-week semester due to attendance at conferences, etc. The Professors requested, and Judith approved, the plan to offer two seven-week courses, each counting for ,5 academic credits. This is the format TPEP already uses at the Hartford Jail. and it has the further **benefit** of exposing students to more academic disciplines and faculty members. The two courses are "Religion and Gender" and an "Introduction to Ethics" course. Anna explained that these courses cover topics that the students have expressed interest in.

In response to a question from Judith about the Trinity credit system, Anna explained that **Trinity counts a semester-length class as 1 credit and requires 35 credits to graduate with a BA**. Students can transfer a 1-credit Trinity class as if it were a 3-credit class from another institution.

AFTERNOON BOOK GROUP

Date: Wednesday, April 2 Time: 1:00pm Location: via Zoom Book: North Woods by Daniel Mason

The Afternoon Book Group met on March 6th to discuss The *Demon of Unrest* by **Erik Larson**, a non-fiction book about the early part of Abraham Lincoln's presidency and the storming of Fort Sumter by the Confederacy as the Civil War began. Mary Jane Peterson led our meeting-- many thanks to Mary Jane for a thought-provoking discussion!

Some of the **topics** we explored:

--We shared what we learned about Lincoln: the uncertainty about certifying his election, the ongoing assassination threats against him, and the need for him to travel secretly into Washington for his inauguration.

--The strategic location of Fort Sumter in the middle of Charleston harbor represented a threat to the Confederacy when it was occupied by Union soldiers. Some of our group had visited the site and shared their observations.

--The **fascinating people** featured in the book, including Mary Chestnut whose diary provides a glimpse into daily life of South Carolinians, and Major Robert Anderson, the Union commander of Fort Sumter who led the soldiers as they held out in the fort before surrendering in April 1861.

The Demon of Unrest led us to make comparisons to our current polarized political situation as Erik Larson did as he wrote this book during the January 6, 2021 storming of the U.S. Capitol.

Looking ahead, on **April 2nd**, we will discuss *North Woods* by **Daniel Mason**, a novel about the history of a **Berkshires house through centuries** from early settlement to contemporary times and the many people who live there. **Elaine Quayle and Sue Aberbach** will lead the discussion.

Our book for the **May 7th** meeting will be *When Women Ran Fifth Avenue:*

Glamour and Power of the Dawn of American Fashion by Julie Satow, a nonfiction book about the influence of American women executives in the New York fashion industry in from the 1930s to the present time. Deb Herskowitz will lead our discussion.
